The Peninsular War (1807–1814) is the military conflict fought by Spain and Portugal, assisted by Great Britain, against the invading and occupying forces of the First French Empire for control of the Iberian Peninsula during the Napoleonic Wars. In Spain, it is considered to overlap with the Spanish War of Independence.

For the first time a British army under a British general was about to take the lead in a land war against a European power. Even in Marlborough's day that great general's achievements were only in part due to the British army.

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\* Originally the British Infantry wore the Stovepipe Shako (Haythornthwaite, 1995; Sapherson, 1991). In 1812 the Belgic Shako began to replace the Stovepipe, but even then several units retained the older model to the end of the war. It is probable that few Belgic Shakos were actually used in the Peninsular.

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In proportion to the numbers involved, the Battle of Albuera was the bloodiest of the whole Peninsular War. The losses on both sides were horrific, Allied losses amounted to 5,916: 4,159 British, 389 Portuguese and 1,368 Spaniards French casualties are harder to ascertain, the official figure drawn up on 6 July revised that number upward to 5,936.]

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
